HOW TO CRAFT THE PERFECT CUBMOBILE

PEANUT BUTTER AND JELLY. Batman and Robin. Boys and cars. Some things just go together naturally.



Most boys love playing with cars, whether they're remote-controlled racers, Hot Wheels replicas or battery-powered ride-ons. In Cub Scouting, the pinewood derby lets boys scratch their automotive itch, but it's not the only option for racing fun. Many packs find that Cubmobile races offer a low-stress, high-octane alternative to the traditional derby. Like pinewood derby cars, Cubmobiles rely on gravity for propulsion. But unlike those pint-size racers, Cubmobiles are big enough to accommodate drivers.

To learn more about the ins and outs of Cubmobile racing, Scouting talked with two Cubmobile veterans. Ryan Coverstone coordinates races for the Lincolnway District in the Anthony Wayne Area Council (Fort Wayne, Ind.); Jeff Wieters runs races for the Live Oak District in the Los Padres Council (Santa Barbara, Calif.).

It Starts With Cars

Plans for cars appear on Page 207 of the Bear Cub Scout Handbook. A Cubmobile is little more than a seat, four wheels and two wooden axles. The rider steers with a rope connected to the front axle — safety blocks keep him from turning too much — and stops by pulling a simple friction brake that drags on the ground.

"Depending on the adult volunteer's role, the Boy Scouts require all adults to attend a variety of training and leadership programs. Every adult leader must annually complete <u>Youth Protection</u>

<u>Training</u>. Each adult must also complete a Fast Start training specific to their program. Position-specific training is provided, including unit committee members, Den Leaders, Cubmasters, Scoutmasters, Unit Commissioners, and others. Skill-specific training is also available to gain knowledge in outdoors skills including camping, hiking, first aid, Leave No Trace, swim safety, climbing safety, hazardous weather, and other skills." WHY TURN IN APPLICATIONS?

Turning in youth and adult applications is an essential part of having new Scouts join your Crew, Pack or Troop. As we move into the fall and begin to bring new Scouts into the Scouting Brotherhood it is important for each new Scout to fill out an application and have the unit turn the application into the office. The application needs to be turned in because without an application the boy is not registered in Scouting and cannot earn advancements. Each Scout or Scouting family should be receiving Boy's Life magazine; there is a three month delay between the date of registration and the first issue of Boys Life the Scout will receive. If the applications are not turned in in a timely fashion then the new Scouts will not receive Boys Life. If a Scout is not registered they are not covered by BSA general Liability Insurance. A Scout is not covered under BSA Insurance until they are properly registered. If there is an accident involving an Unregistered Scout the Leader is liable. When a new Scout registers they are asked to supply their registration fee, if they register in September but their Pack does not turn the application in until December what happened to the money the Scout paid for the Months of September, October and November that was supposed to go to their Scout registration?

This is an easy process, when a new Scout joins your Crew, Pack or Troop ask them to fill out an application on their first night and have a representative from your unit turn the application into the Council Service Center as soon as possible. To make the process even easier on Unit Leadership; notify your District Executive and they will pick the applications up from you.
